FAREWELL NOTE BY THE DIRECTOR

I am stepping down as Director after having spent 5 years in this position. I am grateful for the opportunity to take part in building the Institute into a viable organisation serving as a powerful voice for Ukraine in the UK. It has been a steep learning curve but also an experience filled with joy, fulfilment and lasting memories, as well as the great sense of reward that comes from serving the community.

The Ukrainian Institute London has come a long way over these five years: it gave a platform to a number of influential and exciting speakers, shaping public opinion about Ukraine in this country and internationally. These included **Anne Applebaum, Serhiy Plokhy, Philippe Sands, Peter Pomerantsev, Luke Harding, Yaroslav Hrytsak, Oksana Zabuzhko, Serhiy Zhadan, Oleg Sentsov** and many others. We developed partnerships with some of the UK's leading cultural and educational organisations, which helped us to reach out to new audiences. Among them were the **British Library, the Institute of Contemporary Arts, PEN International, the London School of Economics, the Jewish Museum and University College London**.

The Institute improved **understanding between the Ukrainian and Jewish communities** by running a rich programme of events on many aspects of the shared millennium-long history, including its darker pages, such as the Holocaust. We also profiled Ukraine's arts in London, both the rich heritage and the current cultural revival. **Ukrainian Film Days**, with five screenings held at the prestigious **Cine Lumiere** and **Curzon Soho in 2019**, **became a celebration of the country's cinematic excellence**.

The Institute made huge strides in becoming a mature organisation, able to stand on its own feet: by 2020, it has made significant progress by raising donations and getting grant funding. Our **annual themed fundraising galas** established a reputation for being sophisticated and exciting society events, attracting an ever bigger following, both from the Ukrainian community and well beyond.

I am thankful to the Board of Trustees and the Ukrainian Catholic University for their guidance and support throughout. Special thanks and kudos to **Assistant Director Maria Montague** and **Marketing Manager Anna Morgan** for their tenacity, passion and dedication to the Institute's mission.

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I am sure that under the new Directorship of **Olesya Khromeychuk** the Ukrainian Institute London will continue growing from strength to strength and I wish all the very best to the team for all the fantastic ventures I am sure are to come!

NOTE BY THE CHAIRMAN

Over the past year the Ukrainian Institute London has demonstrated that it is well established, coping well with the effects of the COVID-19 pandemic. There have been quality events, ranging from films to literary discussions and current affairs updates, as well as the continuing Ukrainian language classes and book club. This report covers them in more detail.

The Institute recorded a number of fund-raising successes, including a growing number of generous private donations. In October 2019, together with the Ukrainian Catholic University, we held a big fund-raising dinner, which was moved to a larger venue due to high demand. The Christmas Party, held in the hall of the Ukrainian Catholic Cathedral, was a joyous and memorable evening with a new vertep (nativity play) written and produced for the occasion.


From late March the pandemic lockdown forced us, like other organisations, to hold events online. Assistant Director Maria Montague and Marketing Manager Anna Morgan handled this challenge with imagination and creativity. We soon found that we were reaching wider audiences, not only in London and the UK, but in Ukraine, the US, Canada, the EU and as far away as Australia. And the online events produced a good flow of donations.

Orysia Lutsevych stood down as a trustee. I am very grateful for her support and advice. I know that she will stay in touch, from her position as Manager of the Ukraine Forum at Chatham House. She has been replaced by Svitlana Pyrkalo, a writer closely associated with the BBC Ukrainian Book of the Year award, who works in international development.

After five years, Marina Pesenti is stepping down as Director, but will remain an advisor to the Institute. This report shows how the Institute has rapidly grown and developed under her direction. She has helped to build Ukraine's narrative in the UK, deepened our programming and reached wider audiences year by year. I am most grateful for all that Marina has achieved for the Institute.

I am delighted that the next director will be Dr Olesya Khromeychuk, a historian of 20th century East-Central Europe, specialising in Ukrainian history. Originally from Lviv, Olesya moved to the UK in 2000 and has been active in the Ukrainian community, including by running the theatre company Molodyi Teatr London.

I warmly thank all our volunteers, staff, teachers and trustees. The Ukrainian Institute London is now on a firm footing, with healthy finances, a wide range of academic and cultural partners in the UK and Ukraine and a growing reputation as the "go to" UK organisation to learn about Ukraine and Ukrainians. We look forward with confidence to the next stage of the Institute's development.



Special Projects in 2019-2020

"Jews and Ukrainians: Re-Assessing the Past and Looking into the Future

In 2020, the Institute completed its two-year project, aimed at improving Ukrainian-Jewish understanding and tackling entrenched stereotypes in both communities. We partnered with the Jewish Community Centre JW3 and the Jewish Museum London, and attracted a variety of speakers – civil society activists, intellectuals, academics, artists and Holocaust survivors – from the UK, Ukraine, Canada, Israel and the US. The project tackled a number of complex issues: the history of the Holocaust in Ukraine, remembrance practices and politics of memory, the identity of Ukrainian Jews in contemporary Ukraine and the revival of Jewish cultural heritage in Ukrainian towns. Stories of rescues and stories of collaboration were articulated and the difficult legacy approached through a variety of formats: panel discussions, talks, book launches and film screenings.



SPECIAL PROJECT Ukrainian Film Days in London 5-8 December 2019

The Institute presented the best of Ukraine's contemporary cinema, showcasing the country's fine tradition in film-making and the current wave of innovation through the arts. It partnered with leading cinemas in central London – Cine Lumiere at the French Institute and Curzon Soho – to reach an audience of over 700 people. Four contemporary films – **"Mr Jones," "Homeward," "Wild Fields"** and **"Volcano"**, as well as **"Swan Lake,"** a vintage film from the early 1990s – were featured in the programme, three of which sold out.

The films explore a variety of themes. "Homeward," a road movie and a family drama, tells the story of a father-and-son relationship against the backdrop of dramatic events in today's Ukraine – the war in the east and the loss of Crimea. "Volcano" and "Wild Fields" present snapshots of the absurdity of Ukraine's provincial life, but also charming tales of burgeoning love. "Mr Jones" is a powerful story of Welsh journalist Gareth Jones's journey into famine-ravaged Ukraine in 1933 and his attempts to tell the truth that no one wanted to hear. Finally, "Swan Lake" is a love story set against the backdrop of the disintegrating Soviet system.

The London audience enjoyed an extra treat – talks with **Akhtem Seitablayev**, lead actor of "Homeward" and one of Ukraine's most popular actors and directors, **laroslav Lodygin** (director of "Wild Fields") and **Roman Bondarchuk** (director of "Volcano"). The project was realised in partnership with **Arthouse Traffic**, one of Ukraine's leading film production and distribution companies, and supported by the State Film Agency of Ukraine.

Section F: Financial review and annual accounts

The financial year 2019/20 was, despite the significant upheaval in its second part, our most successful yet:

- Income grew by 30% to almost £90,000, despite the halving of the grant from UCU. This was driven by an almost threefold increase in donations, including those generated by online events launched in 2020. The nearly fourfold increase in income from events deserves a special mention, indicating recognition of their increasing quality and relevance. We have also continued to enjoy strong income from our major fundraising occasions.
- At the same time we continued to invest in the quality of our programmes and the team, however with only limited (7%) increase in costs. Despite the significant increase in income the Director and her team managed to keep cost growth at levels almost in line with last year, a significant achievement in a challenging period.
- This has allowed the Institute almost to triple its net surplus to just over £26,000 for the FY 2019/20. This has further strengthened our financial position, with available funds of £56,330, allowing the Institute to focus on delivering quality programmes and events despite the pandemic and economic recession.

In 2020/21 the Institute, under the leadership of a new Director, will continue to develop its events and programmes as it fulfils its charitable object. For the first time the Institute will operate without any grant from UCU, although our close cooperation will continue. This has been possible thanks to the hard work of all the team and of course the continued support of our many donors and well-wishers.
